

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Due to the time constraints of his working day, which involves teaching others how to draw and design at degree and master's levels, Wilkin often has less time than he'd like to pursue his own illustration output. Knowing that it was important to keep observing and drawing, he figured out a way to do so – by using the hour he spent on the train getting to work each day. By nearly always carrying a sketchbook and propelling/ mechanical pencil, he has captured the morning commute of others through the seasons. Here we see examples from autumn 2015 to autumn 2016 (we can tell the season by the commuters' warm clothes and hats). By the time this book is available, a whole academic year's worth of fellow travellers will have been captured.

Keeping to a regular task like this is a good habit to aim for. With a determination to keep to a drawing plan, you can find yourself maintaining a certain rhythm to your drawing you might not otherwise achieve. It means that

On the strength of his collected train journey drawings, Wilkin was awarded funding to publish a newspaper.
