MODULE LEARNING PLAN

LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT STRATEGY

A variety of teaching and learning methods will be utilised. These will include lectures, videos, case studies, group work, discussions and presentations. The emphasis will be on activity-based learning using realistic materials in a practical context. This module will also encourage a collaborative learning environment that encourages students to learn with, and from, each other. Formal assessment includes a written coursework and examination. The coursework encompasses all three learning outcomes. It will enable students to demonstrate competence and understanding of both the UN Goals and possible implications of their failure or success. The coursework will also allow students' to further explore their potential employability through a considered reflection. The examination is designed to enable students to demonstrate proficiency in LOs 1 & 2 under a different type of assessment method in order to provide variety.

ASSESSMENT STRATEGY- BURNLEY CAMPUS ONLY

Formal assessment for module delivery at Burnley campus will by a reflective portfolio and individual essay. The reflective portfolio encompasses all three learning outcomes, enabling student to demonstrate competence and understanding off all the UN Goals and possible implications of their success and failure. It will also allow students to explore their potential, or current employability through a reflective approach. The individual essay is designed to enable students to demonstrate proficiency in Learning outcomes 1 and 2 is an essay style of presentation, providing an alternative assessment method and further developing this style of academic style of writing.

SCHEDULED LEARNING AND TEACHING ACTIVITY

The lecture focuses on particular UN Sustainable goals to introduce key principles. Students' are expected to prepare for weekly seminars by introducing their own examples through awareness of current affairs linked to sustainability. This will enable students to assimilate core knowledge and make valid connections between theory and real-world examples. Discussion of issues is encouraged to help formulate and reinforce knowledge and awareness. This will also help with employability as students present their ideas to a wider audience thereby improving their communication skills. The module culminates with an exam that enables students to demonstrate their theoretical understanding and its application and relevance to the future in terms of sustainable development.
