## REPORT.

THIS system of publicly feeding the hungry children of Preston on cold Winter nights was carried on for many years by a Committee of gentlemen of all denominations, the late Inspector Dawson being the presiding genius. Three years ago, Mr. Williamson took charge of the Suppers for one winter. The work of sending children to the sea-side, etc., was again placed in the hands of the police, with whom it originated, but the Suppers were discontinued at the close of that winter.

The before-named Committee found there was no intention of Free Suppers being restarted, and, knowing that there was so much poverty in the town, and realising the crying need of the suffering children, it was decided that they should be neglected no longer. The suppers were once more supplied in December, 1903, and given four nights each week until March 11th, 1904. During that time 15.750 meals were provided, at a cost of £26, or less than a half-penny each.

The services of Mr. J. H. Toulmin and Mr. Titus Thorp (members of the late Committee) were greatly appreciated. These gentlemen interested themselves in the matter and interviewed Major Little, who kindly sent a cheque for £15, this being from the Preston Poor Children's Fund for the suppers.

The Committee also desire to testify their deep sense of obligation and thanks to all who rendered help during the past winter. It is intended to continue the suppers next Winter, and, if possible, dinners as well for the children of the very poorest.


