Preston Children's Home: Good Work Goes On

THE boys and girls who had known no other home were fulfilling the founder's greatest desire by turning out to be good citizens, said Mr. W. A. Margerison, the chairman of the Shepherdstreet Mission and Children's Home, at the 66th annual meeting at the Town Hall, Preston, yesterday. Town Hall. Preston, yesterday. They were serving in every theatre of war. One was missing and another was a prisoner of war. The girls were in the Services the Land Army and in the munition factories.

Mr. Margerison, who was presenting his 21st report as chairman of the committee, said that it was not without cause that throughout its long history the work had always had the good wishes and sympathetic interest of the public.

ADMISSIONS

During the year two boys had gone to farm service, a girl had started work as a clerk in a public office, and 13 children admitted temporarily had been handed back to relatives. They had received 22 children during the year. Of these 16 had fathers in the Forces and mothers who were not deserving of the responsibility of having children. On September 30th there were 47 children in residence an increase of six on last year. A hut had been erected to provide 11 more beds in case of emergency. It had not been possible to take the whole family away to the seaside, but 24 children had spent a fortnight at the home in Lytham by permission of Mr. J. H. Toulmin and his committee.

Mr. Margerison said expenditure for the year had been exceptionally heavy. He wished to record their very great indebtedness to the proprietors and editor of "The Lancashire Daily Post" for their annual Christmas appeal which realised the magnificent sum of £327 for general funds. They need hardly say how greatly they valued this help extended to them for nearly 40 years.

The Mayor (Alderman J. S. Howarth), who presided, said that the generosity and sympathy of Preston people was proverbial and he looked to them to forward this excellent work in the town.

EXPENDITURE UP

Presenting the statement of accounts, Mr. H. Southworth said that the amount subscribed by the public from all sources was £1,794, an increase of £256 on the previous year. The total gross amount was £2,949 an increase of £358. The side
