**FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. FRANK E. CHADWICK.**

The funeral of Mr. Frank E. Chadwick, superintendent and secretary of the Shepherd-street Mission, Preston, who died at the Preston Royal Infirmary on Sunday, took place to-day. Prior to cremation of the remains at Manchester, there was a funeral service at the Lancaster-road, Congregational Church, Preston, the pastor, the Rev. J. Gomer Williams, officiating. As the body was borne into the church, the organist, Mr. F. Treasure, played "O Rest in the Lord," and at the conclusion of the service the Dead March in "Saul," and as the remains left the church, Haydn's "Funeral March."

Besides the widow and the family mourners the following public representatives were present: the Shepherd-street Mission, Mr. W. A. Margrison, chairman of the committee and the following members, Mrs. Margerison, Mrs. Marsden, and Messrs. C. H. Plant, J. Wilson, F. C. Messham, and T. Kittson; Mr. A. **DEATH OF SUPERINTENDENT AND SECRETARY, MR. F. E. CHADWICK.**

The death occurred at Preston Infirmary, yesterday, of Mr. Frank Ernest Chadwick, superintendent and secretary of Shepherd-street Mission, at the age of 48. He had been under the doctor for about 12 months, but it was only a fortnight ago that it was found that his illness was so serious.

Mr. Chadwick had been superintendent at the home for a little over two years, but in this time he had won the affection of the children and the esteem of the older people. The home has received greater support, and the number of children under its care has grown from 50 to 50.

His services were praised this morning by Mr. W. A. Margerison, chairman of the Home, who declared that Mr. Chadwick had served the trustees excellently.

Mr. Chadwick was a native of Mossley, Manchester, and his first appointment was as master of Henshaw's Blind School, Manchester. He later became master of Manchester and Salford Boys' Home. He was married in 1921, and came to Preston as master of Fulwood Blind Hostel in January, 1926. He was appointed to Shepherd-street in December, 1927, and his wife was appointed matron.

The funeral will take place at Manchester, after a service at Lancaster-road Congregational Church, Preston, on Wednesday afternoon.
